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What is Methylisothiazolinone +Methylchloroisothiazolinone and where is it found?

This is a widely used preservative in a variety of cosmetics, oil and cooling fluids, latex emulsions, moist toilet papers, printing inks and detergents. The preservative effectively controls growth of bacteria, yeasts and fungi. Allergic reactions usually appear when a product containing Kathon CG is applied on slightly damaged skin. Further research may identify additional product or industrial usages of this chemical.

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What else is Methylisothiazolinone +Methylchloroisothiazolinone called?

This may not be a complete list as manufacturers introduce and delete chemicals from their product lines.

THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP MANAGE YOUR CONTACT ALLERGY

- ☑ **Be vigilant** ... read the product label. Always take the time to read the ingredient listing on product packages. This should be your first step *each* time you purchase a product as manufacturers sometimes change product ingredients. If you have any concerns ask your pharmacist or your doctor.
- ✓ Test the product first. If you have purchased a new product you should test it on a small skin area to see if you get a reaction before using the product on larger skin areas.
- Advise people you obtain services from of your contact allergy. This should include people like your pharmacist, doctor, hairdresser, florist, veterinarian, etc.
- Inform your employer if the source of your contact allergy is work related. You should identify the specific source of the chemical and take the necessary steps to avoid further exposure. Protective wear may be adequate or you may need to make a change in your work activities. Both you and your employer benefit when the cause of your occupational dermatitis is eliminated.
